Describe your process.

My paintings are crimes of passion. I strive to make the genesis of each image as unpremeditated as possible, allowing figures, gestures, and fragments of memory to react with one another and reveal their own narratives with some degree of autonomy. I liken the feeling to that of a hyper-lucid dream, in which I am orchestrating thoughts and imagery from my own subconscious while being continually surprised by their arrival and significance.

What inspires you?

My studio doubles as the space my band, Trocar Buttons, uses to rehearse and keep all of our gear, so it's packed with drums, guitars, and lots of amps and audio equipment. Whenever I feel stuck with a painting, I'll make some kind of racket on a musical instrument for a while and it will focus me again. There are many obvious links between the two mediums, but I feel like my approaches to them have grown even more connected recently, in regard to

intuition, energy, and possibly, sentimentality.

What's on your cultural radar for 2015?

The Hairy Who & The Chicago Imagists movie, the James Ensor exhibition at the Art Institute (through January 25, 2015), and Bob Dylan and the Band's complete Basement Tapes set. I'm currently reading Zia Haider Rahman's novel In the Light of What We Know.

How would you characterize the art scene in your city?

Hardworking, vibrant, and ever-growing. Chicago has a huge community of artists, many of whom are connected in some way to the great art schools that are here.

What are your plans for the coming year?

I'll be continuing a cycle of large paintings I began in my final semester of graduate school last spring, with the intention of showing them all together sometime in the coming months.
